

BEFORE YOU START!

When we are writing a story it can be hard to keep track of the characters that come up throughout the storyline. As an editor I have seen many plot holes in characters and I always advise those who plan on having more than 5 characters in their book to write out an extensive list of who their character is, what they look like, what their traits are and what relationships they have with others. This is crucial to keep track of when writing, there's nothing more embarrassing then a character suddenly having a different hair color or one less parent than at the start of the story!

Here's a little advice, from one writer to another

Don't Fill it All Out at Once

This process is not linear and I advise you to use what resonates with you at any given time in your own process. Use sections as they become relevant to your story and don't force it.

Make Them Real

You want your readers to connect with the characters! Think about your character as if they're a real person with contradictions, emotions, and growth and build on that.

Revisit as Your Story Progresses

This worksheet is here to help you, in the way you need. The best place to start is just to go for it and you can update this worksheet as your character develops through your plot. Try not to overthink it as that can become too overwhelming.

THE BASICS

Let's start with the basics of who your character is. This can help you stay on track when developing your character in an appropriate manner and in a way that resonates with the readers. The basics are important so don't skip them!


PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

This also ties in with how other characters interact with each other and can help you remember what colour hair each character has so they won't get mixed together (a common mistake!).



BACKSTORY

Not every character has a mind blowing, complex and deep backstory. If this resonates with you in your writing it can definitely be useful to have these things thought out. You don't have to go into deep details either, some are good to have on surface level to begin with and they can always evolve and change over the course of your writing.
